

# SPOTLIGHT ON.... READING AT THE ABBEY SCHOOL

At The Abbey, we believe reading is the foundation of success. It opens doors to learning across every subject, develops empathy and imagination, and builds confidence in and out of the classroom. That's why reading is at the heart of our curriculum.

### Form Reading - Shared Stories, Shared Success

Every week, students take part in 30 minutes of dedicated form reading. Across the year, each year group explores two carefully selected texts, chosen to challenge, inspire, and spark discussion. To support understanding, students use reading mats, a rich canvas of visual cues that help them connect with characters, themes, and vocabulary. Carefully crafted questions enable students to explore the text in summary and also start to creatively predict the evolving storyline.

This programme is overseen by Mr Roberts, our Reading for Pleasure Lead, who ensures that every student is introduced to a broad and exciting range of books. Parents can look out for weekly updates on our social media, where we will share progress, highlights, and suggested questions you can ask at home to spark conversations about the books your children are enjoying.

### Targeted Support – No Student Left Behind

We also know that some students need extra help to unlock the world of reading. Miss Garrett, our English Intervention Tutor, leads our ReadingWise intervention programme. This provides intensive, personalised online reading support for students who are not yet confident readers. Miss Garrett carefully monitors students' reading ages, ensuring that anyone reading below their chronological age is identified quickly and given the right support to catch up.

### **English Curriculum – Embedding a Reading Culture**

In addition, our English department ensures that reading is deeply embedded into learning. Students in Years 7 and 8 have a dedicated reading lesson once a fortnight, where they explore texts in more depth and strengthen comprehension skills. This programme is overseen by Mr Prior, who coordinates how reading is woven into the English curriculum.

### Why Reading Matters

Strong reading skills don't just build enjoyment, they directly impact learning across the curriculum. Confident readers:

- Access exam papers more effectively by understanding comparing from their writing.

  Grow their vocabulary and expression, improving the quality of their writing. Access exam papers more effectively by understanding complex questions and instructions
- Develop resilience and focus, which benefit every subject.

In short, reading well equips our students for success both in school and in life.

# SPOTLIGHT ON.... READING AT THE ABBEY SCHOOL

### How Families Can Help at Home

Parents and carers play a vital role in supporting this culture of reading. A few simple steps make a big difference:

Ask open questions about the texts your child is reading, such as:

"What's the most interesting thing that's happened so far?" "Which character do you like best and why?" "What do you think will happen next?"

- Encourage regular daily reading at home, even 15 minutes a day has a huge impact.
- Let your child see you reading too, modelling builds habits.

### A New Chapter for Our Library

We are also delighted to welcome Mr Mitchell, our new Library Manager. Not only is he a published author, but he is also actively involved in developing the school's relationship with the Faversham Literary Festival. Under his leadership, we have lots of exciting events planned, and we look forward to the re-launch of our school library as a vibrant hub for reading, discovery, and creativity.

### **Working Together**

Through these combined approaches, whole-school form reading, targeted interventions, curriculum lessons, and an inspiring library, we are building a culture where reading is enjoyed, valued, and accessible to every student.

Together with families, we can ensure every student at The Abbey becomes not only a skilled reader but also a lifelong one.



### In Year 7, students are reading two books throughout the year:

One book is You Are a Champion: How to be the best you can be by Marcus Rashford, an inspiring and practical guide that encourages young people to believe in themselves and achieve their goals. Drawing on his own life experiences, Rashford offers advice on confidence, resilience, kindness, and staying true to yourself. The book was selected as it helps students build positive mind-sets and develop strategies to overcome challenges, making it an empowering and uplifting text to support their personal growth throughout this year and onward in their journey at the Abbey School.

The other book is When the Sky Falls by Phil Earle, a moving story set in London during the Second World War. It follows Joseph, a boy sent to live with a gruff stranger, Mrs. F, who looks after a rundown zoo. As Joseph struggles to find his place, he forms an unlikely bond with a huge silverback gorilla named Adonis. The novel explores themes of friendship, courage, and hope in the darkest of times, offering young readers a powerful perspective on history and resilience.

### Year 8, students are reading two books throughout the year:


One book is Journey to the River Sea by Eva Ibbotson, an enchanting adventure set in the Amazon rainforest. The story follows Maia, an orphan sent to live with distant relatives in Brazil, where she discovers friendship, courage, and the wonders of a new world. Full of vivid descriptions, humour, and exciting twists, the novel explores themes of resilience, kindness, and the importance of staying true to oneself, making it a captivating read for young readers.

I Am Malala by Malala Yousafzai, the inspiring true story of a young girl who stood up for education in Pakistan despite facing extreme danger. The book follows Malala's journey from her childhood in the Swat Valley to becoming a global advocate for girls' education. It explores themes of courage, resilience, and the power of speaking out, encouraging students to reflect on the importance of equality and standing up for what is right.

### Year 10, students are reading two books throughout the year:

Due to the expanded focus of reading, we had the ability to give the students the choice of what book they would like to read in form time. The first book students selected was Noughts and Crosses by Malorie Blackman, a thought-provoking novel set in a world divided by race and power. Through the story of Sephy, a privileged Cross, and Callum, an oppressed Nought, the book explores themes of prejudice, friendship, and justice. It encourages young people to reflect on issues of equality and empathy.

The second book chosen was The Hunger Games by Suzanne Collins, a bestselling dystopian novel that has captured the imagination of young readers worldwide. Set in a future society where teenagers are forced to fight for survival in a televised competition, the story follows Katniss Everdeen as she shows courage, resilience, and compassion in the face of injustice. The novel raises important questions about power, inequality, and the value of human life.



### Work Experience Programme for Year 10 Students 2026

We are pleased to announce that our Work Experience Programme for Year 10 students, taking place from Monday 29th June to Friday 4th July 2026. This compulsory, week-long placement gives students the opportunity to step away from their usual school timetable and gain invaluable first-hand experience in the world of work.

To introduce the programme, we will be holding an assembly for all Year 10 students, where they will receive clear guidance on how to source, apply for, and follow up on work placements. This session will also offer practical advice on approaching employers and making the most of this experience.

### Why Work Experience Matters

At this important stage of their education, work experience plays a vital role in helping students:

- · Explore potential career paths and industries of interest
- Build independence and confidence through real-world experience
- Enhance CVs and future applications for sixth form, college, apprenticeships, or university
- · Develop transferable skills, such as communication, teamwork, and problem-solving Students are expected to arrange their own placement, ideally in a field that interests them. This process not only gives students a sense of ownership over their future, but also helps them develop essential skills for future job searches and applications.

# E-scooters — are you breaking the law?



Can I ride my e-scooter to school or work?

No, it's Illegal...

E-scooters are classed as motor vehicles and are required to be taxed and insured. It's not possible to get insurance for privately owned e-scooters, which means it's illegal to use them.

Can I ride my e-scooter on the pavement?

No, it's Illegal...

You cannot use e-scooters on public footpaths, cycle lanes or roads.

What happens if I'm caught using my e-scooter in public spaces?

> The scooter may be seized and as a result, destroyed.

If stopped by an officer, you may be asked to complete a breath and drugs test. You also risk a £300 fine and six penalty points on your licence for no insurance.



### Think before you buy:

The number of electrical scooters being used on our streets has risen, as well as reports of serious injury and fatalities.

### Consideration In The Community

Most of you are wonderful ambassadors of the school through your kind and considerate actions towards others in our local community, especially when travelling to and from

Remember it is **not** fair for anyone to be allowed to deliberately make life miserable for others. We will never tolerate nasty behaviour, thoughtless actions or bullying towards those in our school or in the local community. In school always ask an adult for help if you are being treated unkindly or if you feel frustrated about the way others are treating you. **In the community** we need to show we are caring and considerate towards those who live and work near the school, so everyone feels safe and happy when they meet Abbey students.

### DO

Move aside on the pavement to allow to use it.

Speak using appropriate tone and at a sensible level to those you are with, using language that is not offensive or swearing.

Cross roads safely, using the bridge to navigate the A3 and by looking up and checking the traffic for all other streets where there are no pedestrian crossing facilities

Respect residents' property

by walking on the pavements, keeping away from cars, bin, doors and driveways. Be polite to those who live near our school.

### DO NOT

Monopolise the whole pavement space by walking in a group forcing elderly, those with prams or indeed anyone from the community into the road.

Shriek, shout, threaten or swear to those around you, be they friends, members of the public or students who attend other schools - this is intimidating behaviour brings our school into disrepute and this will be followed up and dealt with.

Run across the A3, this is a busy road with TWO speed cameras on it for a reason - the number of accidents. DO NOT become a statistic (injured or worse). Do not walk out directly in front of cars and expect them to stop.


