10 Top Tips for Parents and Educators

EFFECTIVE REVISION AND STUDY SKILLS

As exam season ramps up, revision often becomes louder, busier, and less effective. Many pupils still rely on comfort strategies like re-reading and highlighting. These can feel productive but rarely build long-term memory. This guide will help you create a low-effort, high-impact revision system that teaches pupils how to revise, rather than merely emphasising its importance.

- 1 DIAGNOSE BEFORE DOING**
Before adding more sessions, identify why a pupil is struggling. Are they missing key information, poor techniques, or are they overwhelmed by a lack of confidence? Teaching every topic can be counterproductive. Create a plan. Use a quick check to find out what they know, what they understand, and what they struggle with. Then, focus on the areas they need to improve.
- 2 TEACH REVISION EXPLICITLY**
Most pupils haven't been taught how to revise well, so they pick what they know. Build a revision system into their curriculum time. Demonstrate effective strategies, and encourage them to use them. It's not about the amount of time spent revising, but the quality of the revision.
- 3 PRIORITISE RETRIEVAL PRACTICE**
Make a list of all the topics they need to learn. Rank them by importance. Focus on the most important topics first. Use retrieval practice to test their understanding. This helps them to remember the information better.
- 4 SPACE IT OUT**
Spaced repetition is a powerful tool for long-term retention. Help pupils to plan their revision sessions. Encourage them to review material at regular intervals. This helps them to build strong neural connections.
- 5 MIX, DON'T BLOCK**
Mixing topics helps to improve retention. Avoid focusing on just one topic for too long. This helps to build a strong foundation of knowledge across all subjects.
- 6 USE DESIRABLE DIFFICULTY**
Revision should feel effortful, not effortless. Encourage pupils to challenge themselves. Use techniques like self-questioning, elaboration, and teaching others. This helps to build a strong understanding of the material.
- 7 CENTRALISE MATERIALS SIMPLY**
Revision fails when pupils waste energy finding resources, reorganising materials, or searching for notes. Create a centralised system for all revision materials. This makes it easy to find what they need when they need it.
- 8 PLAN, MONITOR, EVALUATE**
Revision is a skill that needs to be taught. Encourage pupils to plan their revision sessions. Monitor their progress, and evaluate their effectiveness. This helps them to improve their revision skills.
- 9 WRAP MOCKS PROPERLY**
Mocks only help if pupils learn from them. Use them to identify areas for improvement. Encourage pupils to reflect on their performance, and to learn from their mistakes. This helps them to build a strong understanding of the material.
- 10 MAKE TIME VISIBLE**
Revision becomes real when time is protected and prioritised. Help pupils to see the value of their revision time. Encourage them to plan their revision sessions, and to stick to their plan. This helps them to build a strong understanding of the material.

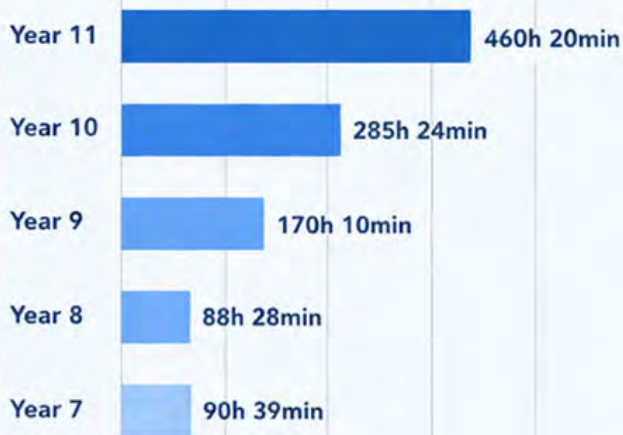

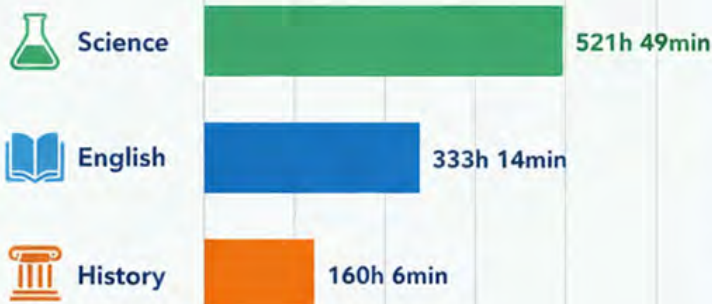

The Abbey School is proud to share our latest Ofsted Report, following our January inspection, which took place under the new Ofsted framework.

Inspectors noted that “the school has been through significant positive change”, judging Personal Development and Wellbeing and Post-16 Provision to be Strong Standard, and confirming that Curriculum and Teaching, Attendance and Behaviour, Inclusion, and Leadership and Governance are operating at the Expected Standard.

Particular praise was given to our Pastoral Support Team, with inspectors commenting that “Pastoral support is a strength. Pupils trust staff to help them manage worries, and... feel safe and supported”.
“We are pleased that Ofsted recognised the strength of our work in personal development, safeguarding and sixth-form provision, which reflects the values and culture we work hard to build every day.

Inspectors recognised that pupils are learning well, feel safe, and are prepared for their next stage, including strong sixth-form retention and positive destinations. Our priority now is to continue strengthening key stage 4 outcomes so they fully reflect the learning and progress we see across the school.” - Dr Speller, Principal

EXAM BUSTERS!

Our Year 11 students took part in two workshops designed to support them through this important exam year: Exam Busters and Resilience.

The Exam Busters workshop focused on helping students prepare effectively for their GCSE exams. Students learned practical revision and memory techniques, exam question strategies, time management skills, and ways to manage exam stress and anxiety. The workshop also introduced metacognition skills to help students reflect on their learning and improve their revision strategies. Students left the session with practical tools to help them revise more effectively, feel more confident about exams, and manage pressure in exam situations.

The Resilience workshop focused on students' wellbeing and mindset during Year 11. Students explored how to build resilience, manage stress and anxiety, and develop a positive, growth mindset. The session encouraged students to reframe challenges as opportunities, build confidence, and find a healthy balance between work, relaxation, and social time. Students also learned strategies to help them cope with pressure and approach challenges in a more positive and confident way.

Together, these workshops supported Year 11 students both academically and emotionally, helping them develop the skills, confidence, and resilience needed to succeed in their exams and beyond.

With the RE GCSE and A-levels swiftly approaching, we have put together some useful resources to support students with their revision.

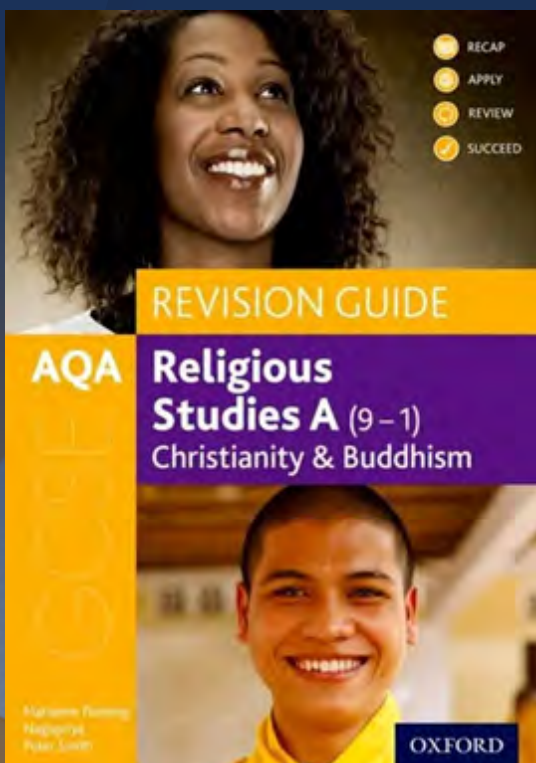

Homework and extra resources over Easter will be set on Arbor. There will also be links to videos that can be used to enhance understanding.

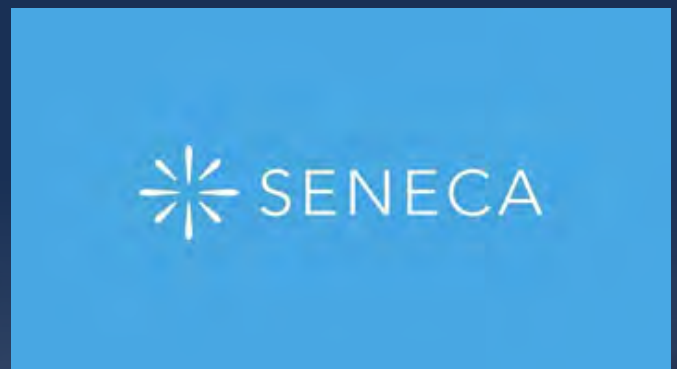
Sixth-form choices

GCSE POD IS BACK!

GCSEPod is particularly valuable for Year 11 students because time is now extremely limited, making revision needs to be focused, efficient and easily accessible. The short, targeted "pods" enable students to quickly revisit key knowledge, address gaps in understanding and maximise the remaining weeks before their exams.

For Year 10 students preparing for early entry Literature, GCSEPod supports structured, early revision, helping them secure core knowledge, build confidence and reduce pressure ahead of their assessments.

What is student finance?

Student Finance England (SFE) provides financial support on behalf of the UK Government to students from England entering higher education in the UK.

The two main costs you'll have while studying are tuition fees and living costs. There's student finance available to help you with both. Depending on your circumstances, you could also get extra financial help while you study.



There are two types of loans you can get from SFE: (You can apply for and receive both loans)



Tuition Fee Loan. This currently is a maximum of £9,790 per academic year (most universities charge this amount per year)

Maintenance Loan. This varies depending on whether you live at home whilst studying, study in London and don't live at home, or don't live at home and study outside London.

Find out if you're eligible

Which student finance you qualify for depends on:

- your university or college
- your course
- your age
- whether you've studied a higher education course before
- your nationality or residency status

You can [visit GOV.UK](https://www.gov.uk) for the most up-to-date information to understand your [eligibility](https://www.gov.uk).



What to expect on your student finance journey?

The typical student finance journey is:

1. You apply for student finance and give us your parents' or partner's details.
2. We ask your parents or partner to support your application by confirming their income.
3. We'll work out how much you can get and let you know in your online account when your application is approved.
4. You register on your course, and your university or college lets us know so we can start paying you.
5. We pay your tuition fees to your university or college, and we pay you any loans or grants at the start of each term.
6. You need to re-apply for student finance for every year of your course.
7. After your course ends, you'll start repayments in the April after you finish or leave. These are handled by the Student Loans Company (SLC).

It's important to keep all your details up to date. If anything changes, you can let us know using your online account.



Tuition Fees

You will need to repay your loans, but not until after you finish your course and are earning over £25,000 a year. Your monthly repayments depend on what you earn, not what you owe. Student Loans Company (SLC) will manage your repayments.

How much could you get?

This depends on where you're living during your course, your household income and other factors. You can check how much student finance you could get using the [GOV.UK Student Finance Calculator](https://www.gov.uk) which will give you an estimate of how much:

- Tuition Fee Loan
- Maintenance Loan
- Extra financial help

This is an estimate based on the information you've provided. You'll be told your exact amount, including any extra funding, after your application is approved.

What is household income?

We assess household income to work out how much Maintenance Loan you can get.

If you apply for the higher amount of Maintenance Loan and any grants, we'll need to assess your household income.

This means we'll ask your parents (who you live with or depend on financially) or your partner to support your application by confirming their income.

Applying for student finance

It is straightforward to apply and usually takes around 30 minutes.

When you apply, you'll need to create an account and complete an online application.

What you'll need:

- Your valid passport details (if you're a UK national)
- Email addresses for your parents or partner – if you're applying for the full Maintenance Loan (not just the basic amount), we'll email them to ask about their income. This helps us work out how much you can get. Their income won't affect your Tuition Fee Loan.
- Your National Insurance number (if you have one)
- Details of your course and university – you can apply before you have a confirmed place

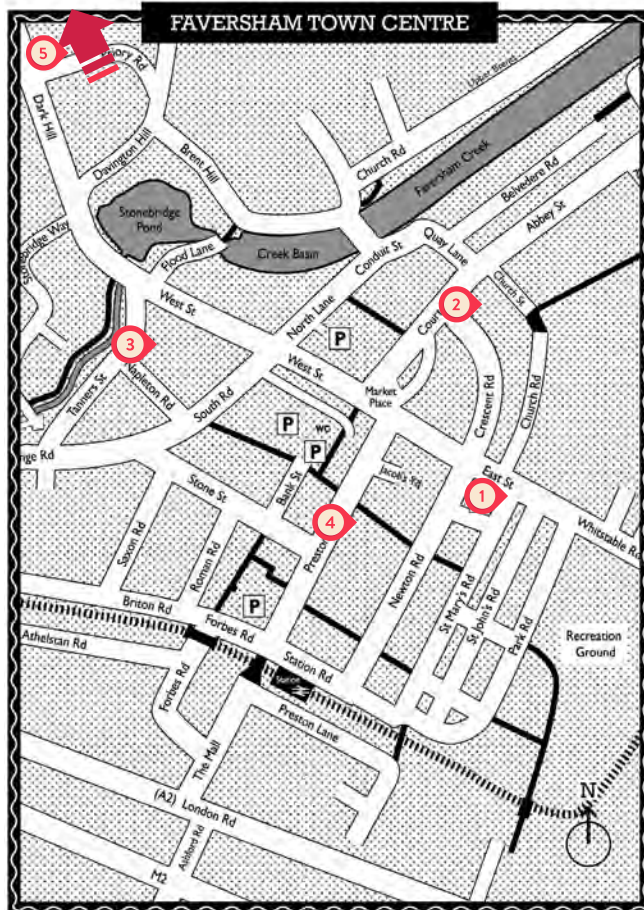

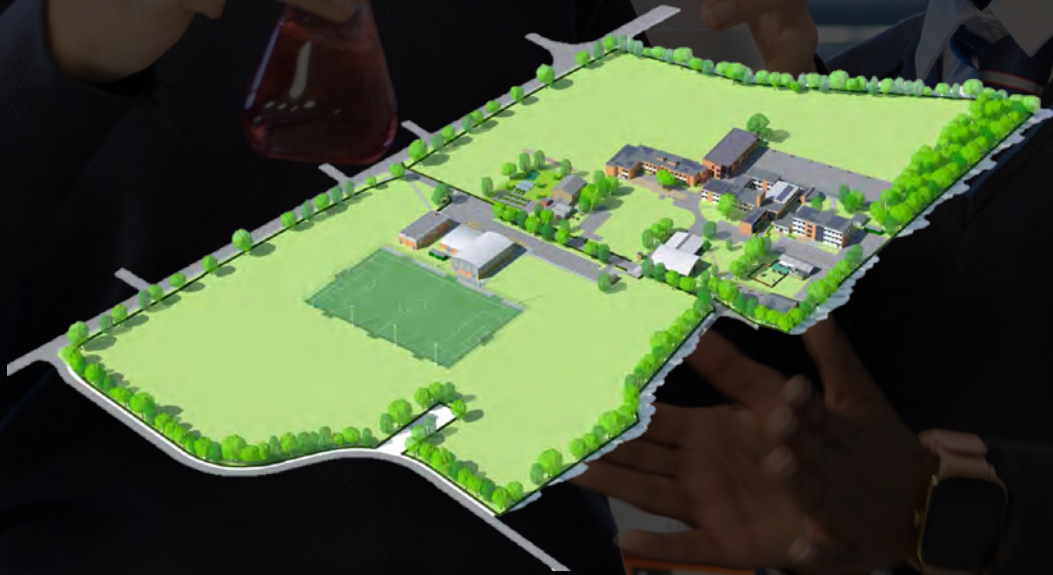
