WHAT IS STUDENT VOICE IN THE **ABBEY COMMUNITY?**

Hello, we are the head of house team, who have been nominated to represent your student voice. We are a team of 10 pupils, from years 7-10: Lexzi B; Sophie H; Aiden B; Izzy J; Maddie S; Stella S; Olivia I; Logan W; Bella H; Charlotte S.

Each year we take on multiple projects that help improve the Abbey Community. In the past, we have been involved in a vaping project, which we delivered to the whole school, outlining the dangerous of vaping and the damage it may cause.

We are very environmentally conscious, and we have taken part in several litter-picks, around the Abbey school, to make the surroundings better, especially on the field. We have also been involved in planting trees, to ensure that the school is surrounded by wildlife, and to absorb the fumes from the A2.

This year we have a number of project that we have taken part in:

We have sold raffle tickets for the Kent Air Ambulance, raising over £150, we have helped arrange focus days and collected money for our charities: The Teenager Cancer Trust and Young Lives vs Cancer, where we raised over £1500.

We had a talk by Ms Wilson and Mrs Holliday in the Centre and learned about challenges of neurodiversity as well as solutions. We are currently putting together a poster to make the school community aware of neurodiversity and how we can find ways to accommodate all types of learners.

Our big project this year is "Onion space" - this is a space that will be built in the old minibus, where students can go to share their problems with a 6th former. We are really hoping to find a sponsor to help us refurbish the minibus with new seating, inspirational quotes and posters, and beautiful flowers. We are aiming for this to be up and running by September. If anyone reading this has contacts or experience in refurbishing interiors, and would be willing to volunteer to help with this, we would be so grateful, as this would help our vision come to life and benefit so many people. If you would be willing to help, please can you contact the school office.

We also present a house assembly each term, to let the school know what is happening in student voice, and how we can work to address issues that you raise. This year we have come up with solutions, such as: wearing the PE kit all the time; sitting with friends at family lunch; more trips and visiting speakers.

As part of the wider Trust Community, Sophie and Charlotte attend a Trust Pupil parliament three times a year, to represent the Abbey school and to share ideas with the Trust about how we can work together to improve school life for all pupils.

Finally, student voice is also shared in our house council, which reps from each form attend, and meets every other term. The heads of house then create an action plan about how we can work to move these things forward.





Sleep Routines

We all lead busy and stressful lives, and young people in particular can spend a significant amount of time using screens and technology.

Many of our students are studying for exams which can have an effect on the downtime they have in the evenings and weekends.

There is a great deal of evidence to show that some time spent relaxing, and away from screens, can be beneficial for good quality sleep. Stress is disruptive to sleep, and the blue light and brain stimulation from screens and devices disrupts the chemicals in the body – melatonin in particular – which then disrupts the natural circadian rhythms of the

Sleep deprivation can lead to a range of difficulties such as poor focus, low energy, poor cognition and recall, and physical health problems.

There are things we can all do to ensure good quality sleep.

- Try to keep to a routine involving switching off devices
 - Spend some time relaxing away from devices
 - Listen to music
 - Read a book
 - Gentle exercise such as walking or yoga
 - Journaling or drawing
 - Avoiding stimulants such as caffeine
 - Use a mindfulness app such as Headspace

Making small adjustments to your routine can lead to improvements in wellbeing, setting us up for a positive day.
