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### Pupil Parliament - June 2025

On Monday 16th June, our pupil parliament representatives attended the termly trust meeting with the Trust CEO and all the other trust school representatives. Students were working in mixed groups, on the question that was posed: "How can we use technology better in schools". First of all students catalogued the technology already being used in the school, such as computers, cameras, laptops, ipads, and software, such as Sparks maths, teams, Seneca, GCSE Pod and assessed the usefulness of these, along with any limitations.

Students were then asked about what improvements they would like to see with new technologies. They explored the possibilities of using AI, such as Chat GPT, to aid the understanding of new concepts. They looked at how technology, such as reading pens, may be beneficial in aiding students with dyslexia, as they enable texts to be read aloud.

### **Refugee Week**

From Monday 16th June – Friday 20th June we have been recognising refugee week. In order to raise awareness of this, the house team have given an assembly about what it means to be a refugee in the 21st century.
