Good evening, everyone, my name is Molly M, and I am standing here tonight as head student in year 13, in what will also be one of my last moments as a student of The Abbey.

Firstly, thank you for being here to celebrate the success and gratitude of the pupils here tonight at The Abbey School and reflect on what has been an incredible journey for all of us.

Tonight is a celebration – of hard work, dedication, perseverance, and personal growth, so to the students here tonight you should be proud of what you have achieved. You all represent the best of what The Abbey School encourages in us all, not only just academic excellence, but also integrity, kindness, commitment, and being the best you can be.

I have had the privilege of attending The Abbey School since year 7, and back then I had no idea how much this school would shape me into the person I am today. Looking back, I remember my first day walking through the school gates not knowing what to expect, I was nervous, overwhelmed, and was carrying a bag almost as big as me. In year 7 everything felt big and new – the school, the expectations, and the people. However, slowly through every lesson, assembly, afterschool club, and even the occasional setback, I started to find my place. Back then, if you told the 12 year old shy me that I would be doing a speech in front of parents, pupils and teachers I would not have believed you. This is down to the fact that The Abbey has helped me grow with confidence and given me immense support when I had self-doubt.

And one piece of advice is just enjoy it as no one believes teachers when they say it will come round really quick, but trust me it does. Helping the younger years has truly made my time as head student worthwhile and my biggest achievement knowing I have made a difference.

As my time at the Abbey School is coming to an end, I soon to embark on a new chapter in my life studying business marketing at university in September, and hope to complete teacher training to become a teacher. I cannot help to forget the countless friendships and memories I have made at this school in which I cherish forever. 




CAREERS FAIR **DREAMLANDS**


POETRY LIVE



GEOGRAPHY A LEVEL FIELDWORK

Year 12 A-Level Fieldwork

As this academic year draws to a close, the Year 12 Geography students have focused their attention onto the most pivotal aspect of their A-Level course. The

The skill of fieldwork is essential for any great geographer. However, with the Non-Examined Assessment (NEA) for A-Level geography, the pressure does mount, as each student needs to consider their own independent investigation. To prepare for this, the Year 12 students have undertaken two crash course fieldwork days, practising numerous data collection methods.

On Monday 14th July, the students investigated how to calculate carbon storage in trees on the Abbey site. Investigating if the A2 main road, or the new housing developments are interrupting the dynamic equilibrium of the carbon cycle in the area.

Then on Tuesday 15th July, the students headed to Tankerton, to investigate and survey both sense of place and coastal environment. Collecting both quantitative and qualitative data, whilst using specialist equipment. Even attempting questionnaires with Tankerton locals, or retail interviews. The students did themselves proud, even when the weather attempted to disrupt the data collection.

Mrs Finney and the geography department are very impressed with how the Year 12's conducted themselves over those past two days of fieldwork, and wish them luck over their own data collection in the summer holidays, ready for Year 13.









YEAR 6 TRANSITION WEEK

KENT TREE PLANTING SCHEME GARDENING CLUB

The Abbey Community have been continuing to support Kent County Council's initiative on tree planting, and we were visited by a member of the team to assess how well the saplings we had planted a few years ago were faring. Gardening club have been making sure that these are being looked after and have the best conditions to flourish.

We have 198 small saplings that we planted by the side of the field, that are very healthy and, as they are native tree species, they are bringing a range of biodiversity to the school site, as well as providing a screening from the A2. Some of our larger trees have also started to self-seed, in particular, Blackthorn, which is very beneficial to a range of butterflies and moths, as well as birds, when they produce berries.

Attendance Expectations for the New Academic Year

As we look ahead to the new academic year, we want to remind parents and carers of the importance of regular attendance. Under current legislation, it is a legal requirement for children aged 5 to 16 to be in full-time education. At The Abbey School, we expect all students to aim for 100% attendance to ensure they receive the high-quality education they are entitled to.

We understand that certain medical appointments are sometimes unavoidable. However, we kindly ask parents and carers to make every effort to schedule these outside of school hours wherever possible, to minimise disruption to learning.

If a student's attendance begins to decline, we will work with families to provide support through an Education Support Plan (ESP). Our priority is always to help students get back on track with their attendance in a supportive and collaborative way.

However, if attendance continues to fall despite this support, we may need to refer the case to our KPAS Attendance Officer at Kent County Council (KCC). This can lead to formal attendance procedures being initiated, and in some cases, may result in legal action being taken.

We would also like to remind parents that holidays during term time will not be authorised. Any unauthorised term-time holidays will be referred to the Local Authority, and a Fixed Penalty Notice may be issued in line with national guidance.

PENALTY NOTICE FINES FOR SCHOOL ATTENDANCE IS CHANGING

THE FOLLOWING CHANGES COME INTO FORCE FOR PENALTY NOTICES FINES ISSUED AFTER 19™ AUGUST 2024

FIRST OFFENCE

The first time a Penalty Notice is issued for term time leave or for irregular attendance, the amount payable will be:

£160 per child, per parent. To be paid within 28 days. This can be reduced if to £80 per child, per parent, if paid within 21 days.

SECOND OFFENCE (within 3 years)

term time leave or for irregular attendance, the

£160 per child, per parent. Again, this will be paid within 28 days. There will be no option for a reduced rate.

THIRD OFFENCE AND ANY FURTHER OFFENCES (within 3 years)

a Penalty Notice will not be issued. Instead, this case will be presented straight to a
