HEADTEACHER UPDATE

Remembrance Week

At The Abbey School, we have been marking Remembrance 100 this week with a range of powerful assemblies aimed at giving our students an insight into why the 11th November is so significant.

In Years 7 and 8, we shared that remembrance is a time where we give thanks for the people who help and protect others now, and who have done so in the past. We showed images of remembrance monuments such as The Sikh War Memorial in Coventry and The Cenotaph in London, and told the story of the late Joan Bunn who volunteered for The British Legion.

For Years 9 to 13, we presented the incredible story of Bill Marks (aged 95) who had served in The Royal Navy during World War 2 and had been a part of the D-Day operation. We also explored how other countries and cultures mark their own Remembrance; for example, in Australia and New Zealand they remember with Anzac Day on the 25th April.

Finally, all groups were read the poem 'We Remember' by Laura Mucha. The messages within the poem are powerful, thought-provoking and provide a much needed moment - or two - of reflection.

Remembrance Parade

Today, at 11.00am, the whole school took part in a remembrance parade out on the playground. We all watched the cadets march past under the leadership of Mr Afful and they were then inspected by Dr Speller. Just before 11am, the Last Post was played and then every single one of us respectfully observed the two-minute silence which was humbling and very touching. Mr Stucken gave a sombre reading of 'In Flanders Fields' and, finally, a prayer was read by Reverend Dan Corcoran.

Our students were incredibly respectful and totally understood the importance of such an event – we could have heard a pin drop.

Our guides, cadets and scouts performed with honour and respect – we really did feel so very proud of each and every one of them.









Spotlight on...6th form History Success

On Tuesday evening, Mr Kenning had the pleasure of attending the Historical Association Great Debate hosted at the King's School Canterbury. Our very own Toby O'Keeffe (year 13) and Henry Keating (year 13) participated in this prestigious public speaking competition, on the question: Why does history matter in 2022? The Great Debate is a public speaking competition where students have five minutes to present their speech arguing their answer to the question.

Both represented the school immaculately. Toby delivered a speech on Francis Fukuyama's End of History thesis, and Henry Keating on how his experiences of Whitstable and its history have allowed him to connect to the wider world.

We are delighted to say that for the second year in a row, the Abbey walked away with a prize. Toby was awarded second place for the debate out of a cohort of around 16 students, coming from schools across the county. Through his outstanding argument and response to questioning, he was able to beat off competition from local grammar and private schools, including Kings and both Langton Grammar schools.

We are all exceptionally proud of both Henry and Toby's achievements and the way they represented the school. Henry is looking to study primary education and Toby History or Archaeology so a fantastic pathway for them both.






6th Form UCAS Support from CCCU

Continued Success for Dover Athletic!

The Academy made history this week reaching the second round of the FA Youth Cup for the first time in our Academy history.

The 6th form Academy players playing for Dover Athletic, made history with a 3-2 triumph against Langley, reaching the second round of the FA Youth Cup. The team were fantastic and displayed a true sense of 'being the best they can be'. This is the first time that DAFA have made it this far and they are already in preparations for their game against Lowestoft Town in the second round – a win here will mean DAFA will reach the third round when all the Premier League Clubs enter the competition.





Not surprisingly, Manager, Mike Sandmann, was full of praise for his talented youngsters. He said: "What a great achievement and what a fantastic performance—I couldn't be prouder of the players. We showed great character after missing the penalty and the players didn't allow it to affect them, which is important. I felt we



could have been in front by more at half-time but you have to give Langley credit for making it difficult. As the manager, I'm always going to be looking to improve, but I don't want to take anything away from the players – they were excellent and have made history getting to this stage, and let's see where it takes us. I would also like to thank the fans who came to watch, so thank you so very much for your ongoing support of the Academy lads – they do really appreciate it.

Swale Youth Forum

On Wednesday, Abbey students attended the Swale Youth Forum where they learnt about the roles of councillors plus contributed ideas to local action plans for safety, education and mental



health. One of the councillors mentioned that one of the biggest parts of their role was to correct misinformation or to keep people informed and students identified ways in which young people can access facts and supporting materials.

The students were then given the opportunity to question the council about past, current and future initiatives. From discussions, it was clear that key information, such as resources for students to support mental health, did not always reach the students. Ideas to build this information into school resources and how to promote them to young people were suggested.

The next meeting is set for Wednesday 7th December. There are spaces available on the Swale Youth Forum who meet at least once a term and work on projects throughout the year. Interested students need to contact Mrs Green if they would like to be a part of future meetings.

Launch of Online Gaming Club

From Monday 14th, our new Gaming Club will be available to each year group daily, except when they are in the canteen eating. There are 26 spaces and the room is managed by duty staff.



Students must leave when asked and be in good time for their turn in the Canteen, or lessons, or whenever asked to leave by the member of staff in charge.

We are hopeful that this club will be a useful addition to lunchtime activities for our students.
