 <u>Academic competitions</u>: Students have excelled in prestigious competitions such as Sports Day; Sports Personality Awards; The PGMOL VAR Tournament; 'Young Volunteer of the Year; The Sparx Maths Homework Competition; House Competition Champions; 'Star Bakers and Designers', amongst many more, all showcasing their exceptional talent, skills, problem-solving, creative and critical thinking abilities.

- <u>Further education, Higher education and Scholarships</u>: many students have achieved places in the 6<sup>th</sup> form provision of their choice, and at university, plus a prestigious scholarship in the USA, enabling them to pursue higher education at renowned institutions. These destinations recognize their academic brilliance, sporting, prowess, leadership qualities, and potential to make a positive impact in their fields of study.

#### 6<sup>th</sup> Form Achievements

Back in August, we were delighted to share our 6<sup>th</sup> form students' latest success as the school community came together to celebrate remarkable Sixth Form results, showcasing an exceptional 22% of outcomes achieved at A\*-B grades.



The achievement is a testament to the dedication and hard work of both students and subject departments. Among the highlights of these impressive results, the History A-Level grades stood out, boasting an impressive 60% A\*-B grades. Additionally, the Economics A-Level results also hit the 75% mark for A\*-B grades, reflecting the collective determination of the school's educators and learners.



#### **GCSE Results - Key Highlights:**

- EBacc Achievement: An impressive 18% of students attained passes in all EBacc subjects, including Mathematics, English, Science, History or Geography, and Languages. This achievement reflects an increase from 2022, emphasising our commitment to delivering a comprehensive and well-rounded education and nurturing versatile learners who excel across a range of disciplines.
- Demonstrating Resilience: Despite the challenges posed by the global pandemic, and the disruption that followed, our community has exhibited exceptional resilience, adaptability, and determination. The 2023 results stand as a testament to the unwavering dedication and perseverance of both students and educators.
- Individual Excellence: Freya S achieved three grade 8s and a grade 7 among her total of nine GCSEs. Jessica F achieved three grade 8s and four grade 7s as part of her impressive results. Similarly, Phoebe W achieved 3 grade 8s and two grade 7s alongside her other passes, whilst also achieving the best progress score in her year group.

Dr Speller commented, "The Abbey School takes immense pride in the achievements of our students this year. The increase in students achieving passes in all EBacc subjects reflects our commitment to providing a well-rounded education that enables students to excel in diverse fields.

#### Spotlight on...Time for Goodbye 😕

#### This summer, we said a final 'Goodbye' to Mr Kevin Dickens MBE!

Many of our current parents, ex-parents, ex-students will be aware that Kevin Dickens has worked for The Abbey School for 40 years. Throughout this time he has modelled kindness, respect and grace. He has worked with multiple headteachers during this time and throughout has been regarded by the wider school community as the backbone of the school. When he initially joined in 1983, Kevin was a music teacher and was quickly promoted to the role of Head of Music. In the late 1980s and 1990s he led the school's nationally recognised steel band and was frequently the face of the school at events across the South East.

He was promoted to a role in charge of SEN and then to the leadership team under Headteacher, Peter Walker. In the late 1990s Kevin wrote his own Management Information System for the school which remained in use up until the pandemic - a mark of the intelligence and skill of this much loved colleague. In more recent times Kevin was promoted to Deputy Headteacher under Catrin Woodend and then to Head of School for the most recent Headteacher, Roly Speller. Whilst Kevin retired from his post as Head of School a couple of years ago, he has continued until recently to be our Director of Resources.

Dr Speller commented: "I can also testify that when Kevin leaves The Abbey it will feel like I have lost my right arm. His wise counsel and encouragement for me to be brave has held me in good stead as headteacher. Kevin was awarded an MBE for services to education 18 months ago for the contribution that he has made to The Abbey School, but as we join a new trust it is important that his contribution in getting us to this point is recognised. Kevin is unflappable, always speaks truth to power and is a model of integrity that everybody on our leadership team looks up to."

Kevin will be much missed by us all and we wish him very well in his retirement and hope it is long, happy and healthy.

England manager Gareth Southgate presented Abbey School student, Archie Suter, from Faversham, with a national award for his selfless volunteering in youth football.

Archie was named **Young Volunteer** of the Year at the FA's National Grassroots awards, adding to the same honour he received from Kent FA last month for his work with Faversham Strike Force. He was handed his trophy by the national team boss, Gareth Southgate, at Wembley and enjoyed a dream day out at the Community Shield on 6 August.



Not only did he get to meet the likes of World Cup-winner Geoff Hurst and Liverpool legend John Barnes at a star-studded event, Archie also got a taste of his dream job by shadowing the FA's social media team as they filmed prematch interviews and warm-ups on the pitch.

"Meeting Gareth Southgate was unbelievable," he said. "We joked before about how amazing it would be if the England manager presented my award and then it happened. I got to meet all the Manchester City and Arsenal players as they arrived including my hero, Jack Grealish."

Archie, 13, dedicates hours each week to Strike Force and fulfils multiple roles including coach, stadium announcer and social media content creator. He also plays for the under-14s.

He has played a major part in the club's new Mini Bolts sessions for children with special educational needs and disabilities. Archie, who is dyslexic, is a favourite with children and parents alike who have praised the empathetic way in which he deals with young footballers with diverse needs.

"Arch is often the first one to arrive at sessions and shows huge maturity and communication skills," said club manager Gary Axford. "He's an absolute credit to the club and the town. What makes him stand out is his willingness to take on new challenges - he goes above and beyond 100 per cent of the time. He never says no to the club or anyone asking for help."

Archie is a fantastic example of our motto – 'Be The Best You Can Be" – well done for this huge achievement, all of us at The Abbey are extremely proud of you!



#### A report from the 25<sup>th</sup> World Scout Jamboree

Hello, I am Megan, a current year 11 in the Abbey School. 2 years ago, I attended a selection day for the 25th World Scout Jamboree. I was successfully selected as one of two people to represent Faversham. I was also one of 108 young people in Kent.

The World Scout Jamboree is where Scouts from all over the world meet together and share cultures. The Jamboree happens every 4 years and is held in a different country each year. Last year it was in America and this year, it was in South Korea. After fundraising the massive £4,000 to go, I left for my big adventure on the 26th July 2023 at 6am.

I met all of the other scouts in Maidstone before taking a coach trip to the airport. I then had a 14 hour flight to Hong Kong, followed by another 5 hour flight to South Korea. When arriving, we found a KFC and could not resist after eating airplane food for over 24 hours.

We stayed in the city (Seoul) for the first week of our trip. My favourite place there was the DMZ. That stands for the Demilitarised Zone. It is where the border of South and North Korea meet. We got to explore the tunnels that North Korea made to invade the South, as well as going to a viewing point where we could see the whole of the North.

After the week in Seoul, we headed to the Jamboree. We were supposed to be there for 12 nights, but we only stayed for 3. We were evacuated after 3 nights due to the extreme 48 degree heat, as well as there being no shade in the field and not everyone having water.

The last night on the Jamboree Site was the best night of my life. My friends and I headed out at 6pm for a little walk and got a message from our leader to go back to camp. When we got back, we got told the news that we were leaving site. That night, I swapped a lot of badges with people from other countries as well as going to site beach and being taught how to explode water bottles by the Scottish Scouts.

We got back to camp at 4am after experiencing many different cultures. It was tiring, but we all slept on the coach on the way to the hotel the next morning. We spent the time we were supposed to be at the Jamboree for in the city. Although it was not what we expected, it was the best experience of my life. My favourite experience would probably be the closing ceremony where we saw a lot of k-pop artists and other talented people perform.

I have many so many friends that I will keep for a life time and I cannot wait for the reunion camp where I get to see everyone from Kent once again. In total, I was there for 3 weeks without my parents, and with a whole load of other scouts like me.

I would definitely recommend scouting, as well as the next Jamboree in 4 years' time. It will be held in 2027 in Poland for anyone between the ages of 14-18 at the time.

#### **The Colour Run**

Led by Mrs Green and Mrs Le Brunn-Healey, Year 8 found out what being different means and how the festival of Holi and our Colour Run can be a great way to express your differences. We looked carefully through the lens of what 'being different' means to different communities and had the opportunity to reflect on how we can treat others with dignity despite our differences.

What is the Colour Run? The Colour run has been inspired by the Holi Festival, which is a festival that celebrates spring, love and colour. This festival is a spectacularly beautiful event, as well as a great excuse to get extremely messy. Originating in India, this two-day festival culminates with coloured powders (known as 'Gulal powder') being pelted at each other and water used to help ensure that the colour sticks! Students learnt about the Holi Festival as part of their Religious Education curriculum so this was a fantastic opportunity for them to enjoy a similar experience, putting what they have learned into a relatable context. The different colours of powders created a rainbow effect which gave us the chance to reflect on what makes everyone unique and different. All students were gifted an Abbey School Colour Run t-shirt and a pair of sunglasses!











#### Norfolk Lakes Trip – Year 9 Residential

During the Community Week a group of Year 9s visited one of the UK's best facilities for school groups - Norfolk Lakes which provided students with the opportunity to not only experience a range of new activities, but also to receive some real tuition from professional activity instructors.

The instructors were engaging and fun, while offering supervision and teaching of an excellent standard. The emphasis is on water based activities such as sailing, windsurfing, kayaking, canoeing, paddle-boarding and more! Our students had a great time too participating in the huge variety of activities on offer. We hope they've made some wonderful memories that they will look back on for many years to come.

















#### The One Punch Assembly

One Punch UK was set up in 2014 to raise awareness about the devastation a One Punch assault can cause. The charity founders unfortunately have firsthand experience as they lost their 19 year old son Kristian to a One Punch Assault in 2011. They set up their campaign with the support from many other organisations and now raise awareness by delivering workshops to school, colleges, prisons, probation hubs, Etos units, clubs and groups.



Within the session, they openly discussed all the factors that lead up to One Punch assaults to make people aware of their actions and the potential consequences.

#### Sign Language Session

On the Wednesday of Communities Week, students had the opportunity to learn some basic sign language, a visual means of communicating using gestures, facial



expressions, and body language. Sign language is used mainly by people who are deaf or have hearing impairments.

Why did we deliver this? This is such a useful skill to have, especially in an emergency situation. During the session, students had to be resourceful and work hard to master basic sign language. This was followed by a group reflection on why knowing basic sign language is so important.

#### **Carousel of 3 Different Activities**

A further session on Wednesday focussed on helping those who may be less able.

**Using different support aids** – students had the opportunity to learn about different support aids used to help those who are less able

**Blind obstacle course** – students navigated a blind obstacle course which gave them the opportunity to be resourceful.

**Creating a plan for supporting those less able** – students reflected on how they could support someone in a workplace or school who is less able. This was an important session for them to reflect on what able-bodied people can take for granted.

#### Sport with Dignity

Students were given the opportunity to take part in several sporting events with their tutor group. However, there was a twist...the students had to be very resourceful as there were not the typical events, but were a mix of skill, quick-thinking, with participants making sure they worked together as a team.

#### The Fire Fighters Charity – 80<sup>th</sup> Celebration

In celebration of The Fire Fighters Charity 80th anniversary, Year 9s and staff formed a huge human 80 which was captured by drone - how amazing is this? It's been a delight and a huge privilege to support this wonderful charity this year so huge thanks to our local fire service for giving so much of your time.

This charity is really important to us as we have a number of students who have families and friends who need and rely on the support this charity provides. It's personal to us as a school and we want to help in whatever way we can.

Aim a Little Higher is an organisation that provides support to schools to raise student aspirations and prepare them for the real world. As part of the final week of 'Summer Communities', the Careers department organised a trip to The University of Kent and Canterbury to give our Year 10s a better understanding of the range of courses on offer within Higher Education and also to provide an insight into university life. It was an extremely informative day as we completed a tour of the campus, met the lecturers and attended a lecture!

This was a great experience for our students to boost their aspirations and to provide awareness of the range of career pathways that a university can offer.

And finally, for the perfect end to Communities Week, we ended the term with our annual Summer Fete. This was such a fabulous way to celebrate the best of what The Abbey School can offer our students, both in and out of the classroom. #### Wilder Kent Award

We are delighted to announce that we have won Bronze at this year's Wilder Kent Awards for all our hard work in helping to create a 'Wilder Kent'. These awards were set up by Kent Wildlife Trust in 2020 as a way of recognising and rewarding the positive actions that groups across Kent are taking in order to protect wildlife and safeguard nature for future generations.

Now in its 3<sup>rd</sup> year, 2023 saw the Wilder Kent Awards gain over 65 entries from groups and organisations across the county so we are extremely proud to be part of a growing army in the fight against the nature and climate crisis.


